Preface:

This is the tour that everyone was looking forward to, they were kept on the move, and a great time was had by all in attendance. The weather was perfect all weekend long. Meals were excellent at every stop and the people we met were wonderful. It was a once in a lifetime deal, moments to treasure for sure. Our bus driver was safety conscience at all times.

Day One - Friday:

Very impressive, a brilliant art work - within the outside environment as its backdrop.



In the Middle of the traditional Kurpark is the Wandelhalle with its "historical pump room" and the place where you are able to drink many different types of spring water. The building itself was erected in the Hellenistic style in 1929 which includes a museum that explains the history of this "Spa-Resort" through the ages. This also includes "the historical night-watch-man and "the amazing washer-woman".

The famous "Wildungen's mineral springs" have been well known and very much appreciated since the 14th Century. The town was first documented around the year 800, and then received its town charter in 1242. Then as is now called "spa-town". It was given the title of "Bad-Spa" in 1906 and it still carries that healthy and charming atmosphere of a very respected "health resort" and vacation destination for tourists.

The spa-facilities are also located in Reinhardshausen that belongs to the town of Bad Wildungen. These proven therapies treat kidney, bladder, cardiovascular and metabolic diseases. Also helping cases of rheumatology, orthopedics — beauty care and wellness issues.

Now we continue our tour, for an extensive hike through the park in order to reach the other side and the inner city. To find a place for lunch ... well at least a coke-a-cola – a cold beer and a little wine for the lady with us "Tina". Then onto another restaurant nearby for a real "show down". After this extravaganza, we walk to their hotel where we are all staying for two nights and three days. Finally we settle into our nice rooms. About hour later we once again board the tour bus and head for the venue where this mighty little troupe of "Day Dreamers" will join up with another Square Dance Group called "The Teddy Bears". To which I soon learned, were 100% female with no male square-dancers in their club.

The Teddy Bears welcomed all of us with open arms, a smile and love in their hearts. The food was delicious and the company splendid. A great time was had by everyone and then we returned to our hotel – all semi-exhausted – but one last party on the roof before saying good-night. This is one feisty crew trust me on this! They had a reserve of energy that I lacked, so I sat this one out.



Day Two - Saturday:

This was followed by a boat-ride on what was once a gigantic man-made lake, but is now little more than an embarrassing, enlarged, duck pond. You used to be able to board the boat directly across from the parking lot, because they were both on the same level. But these days, passengers need to walk down to the boat that is about 100 yards lower than ever before. Gabi reports that the coffee and especially the cake were excellent. The next stop is off to another German castle to have a look around and enjoy another experience. As Elke and I remain on the bus this time around. We look forward to their report.



The main area that we are in is called Kellerwald. The Kellerwald with its rural surroundings cover an area of over 120 square km of unspoiled beech forest that also includes more than 500 km of pristine hiking and nature trails.

And here started the story of snow white: This is the "DWARVEN HOME of SNOW WHITE and HER SEVEN DWARF'S: The Grimm Fairy Tale is Walt Disney's very first animated feature.

Released December 21, 1937. Jealous of Snow White's beauty, the wicked queen orders the murder of her innocent step-daughter, but later discovers that Snow White is still alive and well, and hiding in a cottage with seven friendly little dwarf miners. Disguising herself up as an ugly hag, the queen brings a poisoned apple to Snow White, who falls into a death-like sleep that can only be broken by a kiss from a prince. The prince sees Snow White in her glass coffin comes over to her, instantly falls in love with her, upon being enchanted with her beauty. He kisses her, she awakens and is in love with him as well. The story of the magic mirror:

Though more of a magician's trick than any magic – the magic mirror was in fact a real thingt. The mirror talked back thanks to "acoustic manipulation effects" instead of any magic being involved. The mirror was more of a toy than a looking glass as it reverberated thus giving the lookers words back to her ... giving the appearance / illusion that the mirror could speak. The mirror was constructed in 1720 and resides in Lohr castle that's now a museum. Lohr was known for its glass-works and also for its poison that's called "nightshade" that grows so abundantly in this region.

About the real SNOW White:

Margaretha grew up in Waldeck, Germany and her beauty attracted "The prince of Spain" but never got her "fairy tale ending". She was age 17 when she moved to Brussels because of her step mother and it is here where Phillip II of Spain saw her for the first time and decided to marry her. But Prince Phillip's father was the Holy Roman Emperor and didn't support this union. At the age of 21 Margaretha suddenly died from a mysterious illness and history points to the Emperor as her killer. The marriage was seen as inconvenient and she was dealt with in a way that made it appear to look like suicide. Given her shaky hand-writing towards the end of her life, was indicative of tremors caused by being poisoned. Her mother was already dead by the time Margaretha fell ill. She died before the Prince could make her a princess. Snow White was based on her life and the truth came to light in 1994.

By scholar Eckhard Sander. He says, she had blonde hair, and was poisoned. The Grimm brothers also said Snow White had blonde hair.

About the real Dwarfs:

In this particular area, young boys were put to work in the metal mines. All fed poorly, treated badly and used as child labor, very over-worked in general. The lack of good nutrition was enough to stunt their growth and make them life-long dwarfs. They worked in the copper mines, tin mines, coal mines. They wore bright colored hats, so that in case of cave collapse they could be easily found. The real dwarfs were heard singing coming and going from the mines. Some mines were discovered in 1440, German town of Altenberg – "Tin Mines".
